

I. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



REBECCA LOSLI, P.E. President Illinois American Water

Making an Impact and Providing Opportunities in Our Community

At Illinois American Water, we are immensely proud of the work we do to improve the 148 communities we serve, and our diverse partners provide the critical leverage needed to make that impact. Together, we achieved \$101 million in spending across minority, women, and veteran supply partners in 2023, more than 33% of our total procurement spend. This marks the sixth year of increased growth of our supplier diversity initiative, exceeding our 30% target for 2023.

As we continue with our plans to invest approximately \$250 million in water and wastewater system improvements annually, we will continue to expand the pool of diverse suppliers. Illinois-based diverse suppliers captured 69.6% of all spending among Illinois-based suppliers, a major contribution to local job creation.

In the development of our goals for 2024 and beyond, we aim to be transformational, not transactional, in our approach to identifying success measures beyond spend. To accomplish that goal, we are focusing on strengthening the formal development and mentorship model within our supplier diversity initiative. We are engaging our diverse partners to develop and integrate smart water solutions to address pressing energy and conservation challenges, such as decreasing emerging contaminants, scaling broader to meet the needs for our lead service line replacement program, and increasing supply chain competitiveness overall.

I invite you to explore the details of the 2023 report, where you will discover the stories that highlight our trusted and consistent partners who have been behind our success and our plans to develop and grow new partnerships as we build a stronger Illinois.

III. TERMS & DEFINITIONS

BOOSTER STATION	A booster station is a collection of booster pumps strategically located in a water distribution system. Pump stations work to maintain consistent pressure and provide adequate flow. These stations may also move water from ponds, reservoirs and water towers into the system.
CERTIFIED	Means currently certified as MWDVBE by an authorized certifying body, such as the National Minority Supplier Development Council (NMSDC) or its affiliate regional councils, the Women's Business Enterprise National Council (WBENC).
CONTROL	Means overall fiscal/legal responsibility and exercising the power to make policy decisions.
DISABILITY-OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (DOBE)	Businesses that are 51% owned, controlled, operated and managed by a person(s) with a disability.
DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (DBE)	Means a business that is usually certified by a federal, state or local government agency as having met all of the government standards that award eligibility, but may include women, minority, disabled and other disadvantaged as a result of economic disadvantages with respect to education, employment, residence or business location, or social disadvantage and lack of business training.
HISTORICALLY UNDERUTILIZED BUSINESS (HUB)	Means a business located in a "historically underutilized business zone," owned and controlled by one or more U.S. citizens, and at least 35% of its employees must reside in a HUBZone. It must appear on the list of Qualified HUBZone Small Business Concerns maintained by the SBA.
LESBIAN, GAY, BISEXUAL AND/OR TRANSGENDER- OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (LGB/LGBTBE)	Means a business that is majority (at least 51.0%) owned, operated, managed and controlled by a lesbian, gay, bisexual and/or transgender (LGBT) person or persons who are either U.S. citizens or lawful permanent residents, exercises independence from any non-LGBT business enterprise, has a principal place of business (headquarters) in the United States and has been formed as a legal entity in the United States.
LIFT STATION	Facilities designed to move wastewater from lower to higher elevation through pipes.
MINORITY-OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (MBE)	Means a business concern in which at least 51.0% of the ownership and control is held by individuals who are members of a minority group and of which at least 51% of the net profits accrue to members of a minority group. Such persons include, but are not limited to, Black Americans, Hispanic Americans, Asian Pacific Americans (persons with origins from Japan, China, the Philippines, Vietnam, Korea, Samoa, Guam, the former U.S. Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands [Republic of Palau, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Republic of the Marshall Islands, Federated States of Micronesia], Laos, Cambodia [Kampuchea], Taiwan, Burma, Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, Singapore, Brunei, Macao, Hong Kong, Fiji, Tonga, Kiribati, Tuvalu or Nauru), Subcontinent Asian Americans (persons with origins from India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Bhutan, the Maldives Islands or Nepal), Native Americans (American Indians, Alaska Natives, Aleuts and Native Hawaiians), and members of other groups designated by the U.S. Small Business Administration as minorities.

OWNED	Means at least 51.0% of the business or, in the case of a publicly owned business, at least 51.0% of the stock is owned by a minority, woman or service-disabled veteran.
RFI, RFQ, RFP	Request for information, quote or proposal.
SERVICE-DISABLED VETERAN-OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (SDVBE)	Means a business concern that is (a) at least 51.0% owned by one or more service-disabled veterans or, in the case of any publicly owned business, at least 51.0% of the stock of which is owned by one or more service-disabled veterans or (b) in the case of a veteran with a permanent and severe disability, the spouse or permanent caregiver of such veteran.
SMALL DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS (SDB)	 Means a "for profit" business that qualifies as "small" per the SBA Table of Small Business Size Standards Matched to North American Industry Classification System Codes. That is at least 51.0% unconditionally owned by one or more U.S. citizens who are socially and economically disadvantaged individuals. Whose management and daily business operations are controlled by one or more U.S. citizens who are socially and economically disadvantaged individuals. The personal net worth of each individual claiming economic disadvantage is less than \$750,000 (except for tribes, Alaska Native Corporation-Owned Concerns [ANCs], Community Development Corporation-Owned Concerns [CDCs] and Native Hawaiian Corporation-Owned Concerns [NHOs]). Note: ANCs, NHOs or CDCs must meet the "ownership," "management" and "control" criteria in Title 13 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 124.109, 124.110 and 124.111, respectively.
SMALL BUSINESS (SBE/SMB)	Depending on the industry, "small" is defined by either the number of employees or average annual receipts of a business concern. Website references for size standards by NAICS code is: sba.gov/federal-contracting/contracting-guide/size-standards
SMALL DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS 8A (SDB-8A)	Means a designation given to small companies owned by socially and economically disadvantaged persons, so that they may bid and obtain federal government contracts and other assistance to develop their business. The business owner must be eligible under the same rules and guidelines set down by the federal government.
VETERAN-OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (VBE)	Means a business concern that is at least 51.0% owned and controlled or, in the case of a publicly owned business, at least 51.0% of the stock is owned by an owner or owners who are veterans of the U.S. military, ground, naval or air service, who (a) served on active duty for a period of more than 180 days and were discharged or released with other than a dishonorable discharge or (b) were discharged or released from active duty because of a service-connected disability.
WOMEN-OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (WBE)	Means a business concern that is at least 51.0% owned and controlled by a woman or women or, in the case of any publicly owned business, at least 51% of the stock is owned by a woman or women. Such women's business enterprise shall further be classified as either minority or non-minority women-owned business, depending upon the greater portion of ownership.


Regulated business spend with certified diverse suppliers is 22.7% of total sourceable spend. This reflects 0.7% above the 2023 goal of 22.0%; however, \$1.1 million in HUBZone and DBE spend were excluded from the above chart and not counted in total diverse supplier spend.








Illinois American Water's 2023 Illinois-based VBE Spend


E. Professional Services

In 2023, professional services spending totaled \$5.8 million, a 52.1% decrease from 2022 spending of \$12.1 million, with Engineering, Legal, and Corporate Consulting representing the top three spending categories. In 2022, legal expenditures increased by 127% due mainly to rate case services; in 2023, legal spending returned to a normal spending volume, which resulted in a decrease of approximately \$900k. Engineering spending was also impacted, with a reduction in construction projects and a significant engineering consultant being acquired by a non-minority owned company.




Historical Total Spend Data 2021–2023






F. Diversity Mix of Illinois-based Diverse Business Enterprises



Quarter 1: January–March

Bolingbrook Black History Month Awareness

Celebration: Illinois American Water's Inclusion, Diversity, and Equity grant awarded to the Bolingbrook Black History Month Awareness Club (BBHMA Club), a non-profit organization seeking to promote diversity through education. In honor of Black History Month, the BBHMA Club organizes a community-wide Black History Month Celebration. The celebration program consists of poetry reading, an African Fashion Extravaganza, live music, a dramatic skit, African youth dancers and an academic speaker. The goal of the program is not only to entertain the community at large but also to educate about African American heritage and encourage education by providing scholarships to high school seniors.

Quarter 2: April–June

CONSTRUCT Infrastructure Academy: Illinois American Water Field Operations and Talent Development teams support the CONSTRUCT Infrastructure Academy, an 11-week training program. CONSTRUCT provides the required knowledge and physical competencies to compete for entry-level positions in the construction and utility industry. Illinois American Water's Workforce Diversity Grant program supports the Chicago Urban League, our agency partner who identifies, trains and recruits for the program. The Illinois American Water internal team provides additional training and exposure to career options in the water industry throughout the training program.

Quarter 2: April–June (cont.)

ILAW Inclusion Day: Designed for American Water employees to participate in inclusion, diversity, and equity activities. We celebrate our Beautifully Different culture at American Water and collaborate on ways to continue creating a work environment where everyone can be themselves. In addition, the Chicago employee culture team shared information on how to effectively "include" persons with disabilities in our community and work environment. The Individual Advocacy Group, Inc. (IAG) is a non-profit agency located in the ILAW Chicago office community that provides a full array of quality. customized, outcome-focused supports for people with developmental, emotional, and neurological disabilities. IAG programs include Community Integrated Living Arrangements. All of IAG's programs are community-based, and all residential programs are geared toward families of four or fewer people. The Chicago employee culture team made toiletry kits for the 106 residents supported by IAG.

AW Regional Supplier Diversity Symposium: On May 11, the first Midwest Division Supplier Diversity Symposium was held in Maryland Heights, Mo. This is the fifth year Supplier Diversity professionals from American Water gathered for a day-long meeting focused on diversifying spend, but it was the first of its kind to engage leaders from operations, engineering and supply chain in Missouri, Illinois, Iowa and Indiana. The event started with opening remarks from Presidents Rich Svindland, Rebecca Losli, Randy Moore and Matt Prine. We welcomed suppliers and vendors from a large part of our company's footprint to establish new connections and to also nurture existing relationships. More than 100 attendees were present, including minority-, womanand veteran-owned company representatives who interacted with other business owners and American Water employees.

POLICIES

American Water Works Service Company, Inc., its subsidiary and affiliated companies are committed to creating an inclusive procurement process that is accessible and fair to all suppliers based on their ability to meet the company's performance, price and quality requirements. Our employees are responsible for identifying, qualifying, selecting and managing the procurement process for goods and services to assure that qualified diverse suppliers are appropriately included. Our employees must comply fully with all company policies and practices relating to the inclusion of diverse suppliers. We also strongly encourage our prime contractors and major suppliers to support supplier diversity by creating a competitive procurement process that provides opportunities to the greatest extent possible for diverse supplier sub-contractors and businesses. Excellence in supplier diversity will lead to excellence in supply chain management and will advance American Water's financial and operational goals while providing opportunities for success to a wide and diverse range of businesses in the communities we serve.

A. Supplier Diversity Language

In accordance with American Water's Procurement Policy and supplier diversity practices, specific contracting language is required to include diverse suppliers in subcontracting opportunities and provide evidence of actions taken to meet targets. The supplier diversity utilization goals for diverse suppliers are 25.0%, with 10.0% specific to MBEs in Tier II spending for all competitive bidding events and finalized agreements.

The American Water Supplier Diversity Subcontracting Plan is a required submittal with all Requests for Proposals, quarterly reports and final payment applications (see Appendix A).

B. Organizational Responsibilities

- a. It is the responsibility of the Senior Manager, Corporate Supplier Diversity, and Illinois American Water Program Director of Supplier Diversity to provide overall program management, strategy development, implementation and monitoring to assist Supply Chain and business unit partners in their efforts to increase opportunities and contract awards to small and diverse businesses. The governance of the corporate supplier diversity program is the responsibility of the Senior Manager, Corporate Supplier Diversity who reports to the Chief Procurement Officer.
- b. Supply Chain shall assist business units with the identification and inclusion of diverse suppliers in the sourcing of services and materials. They shall also facilitate cross-functional category teams with members representing Supply Chain, Supplier Diversity, Engineering and other business units as appropriate for the inclusion of diverse suppliers in sourcing events for national categories.
- c. It is the responsibility of the American Water business unit representative to work with Supply Chain, Tier I and Tier II suppliers, and business advocacy groups to ensure opportunities are provided to diverse suppliers. The business unit is also responsible for the day-to-day oversight of these suppliers.

C. Reporting/Metrics

Corporate Supply Chain will run monthly Tier I reports and quarterly reports that will include Tier I and Tier II diverse supplier spend with the following features:

- + Automation of quarterly subcontractor diverse spend reporting
- + Key word, NAICS and other segment Search Options that allow the supplier diversity and procurement teams better visibility into the products and service capabilities of diverse business owners
- + Percentage of competitive procurement events that include a qualified diverse supplier
- + Percentage per diversity classification (e.g., women-owned, minority-owned, veteran-owned, etc.) of the included diverse suppliers

C. Reporting/Metrics (continued)

- + Percentage of contracts awarded to diverse suppliers
- + Participation in supplier diversity outreach activities (e.g., trade shows, networking events)
- + Year-over-year comparisons of MBE, WBE and VBE spend (\$ and %)

D. Diverse Spend Collection

Tier I spend data is recorded through American Water's procurement system when payment is made to a supplier.

In accordance with the American Water Supplier Diversity Subcontracting Plan and the current fully executed contract, Tier I prime suppliers are required to submit quarterly Tier II diversity spend reporting through the Supplier Diversity Portal amwater.com/corp/Partners-Suppliers/Supplier-Diversity/. Diversity spend data is collected during the bidding process through the Supplier Diversity Subcontracting Plan.

VI. SUPPLIER DIVERSITY GOALS

Illinois American Water Supplier Diversity goals continue to focus on Access, Development, and Growth. In the past 6 years, we have achieved year-over-year continuous growth by setting assertive spending targets and exceeding those targets. Illinois American Water will stay the 2024 spending target of 30% of total procurement spend with diverse suppliers.

2024 Goals are estimated targets that are subject to change based on adjustments made to operational plans that impact the expected procurement of goods and services.

This intentional shift is to focus our efforts on identifying and developing suppliers that will provide direct value to the product or service that we bring to market to achieve a higher level of competitive advantage. The development efforts will consist of:

- + Pilot project opportunities that include new technologies and/or work streams outside of awarding large contracts to a supplier with no prior history with the organization
- + Provide opportunities for suppliers to scale workforce at a responsible rate based on graduated work volumes over time
- + Decrease suppliers' financial risk for penalties for delivery delays or quality failures
- + Provide access to in-house training programs, experts, and consultants
- + Time to understand what kinds of investments are required to make high-potential suppliers successful
- + Exposure to Water Industry Associations and networks

These efforts in collaboration with the formal American Water Diverse Supplier Development Program in partnership with the Rutgers University MBA Program serve as continuous improvement efforts to move beyond adding supplier diversity mandates to the traditional procurement approach.




Exhibit B: Illinois American Water's Diversity Percentage of Spend with Certified Suppliers

IX. CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

The consistent and persistent challenges that diverse suppliers face in the utility market are related to access to capital, limited networks, and competition with large established firms. While these challenges are not new, the current political and economic environments have made overcoming these obstacles even more challenging. Mounting litigation, E.E.O.C complaints, limited capital and resources, amicus briefs and other legal demands against Federal programs and corporate diversity initiatives have clouded the future of agencies and programs focusing on the advancement and development of diverse-owned businesses.

The current economic environment is improving, but diverse businesses are impacted more from the higher inflation rates and higher cost for goods and services in a utility industry where the capital and start-up cost are a barrier to entry. These economic constraints create an additional obstacle for experienced diverse suppliers to increase operating capacity to compete for large new volume contracts, fulfill contract requirements, and avoid the penalties for lateness if awarded.

To execute on American Water's development strategy to grow and scale diverse and small business for long-term growth, the company continues to collaborate with suppliers who have significant vulnerabilities with cash flow management. Working to negotiate business payment terms allows these businesses to limit their dependence on external funding sources to meet operating expenses and focus on expansion efforts.



"Water doesn't care if it's Christmas or your birthday," so says Joel Kirby, president of Shaw Brothers Concrete Construction in Champaign, Illinois. "We and Illinois American Water (ILAW) know that all too well. When a water pipe breaks, or there's a sewer issue, we are there, night or day. Yep, even on Christmas and New Year's Eve."

That kind of commitment is what has helped Shaw Brothers grow alongside Illinois American Water. When ILAW purchased a privately held company 17 years ago, they kept Shaw Brothers. "They inherited us, and now they're 'stuck' with us," Joel says with a chuckle. "But, it's a really good fit. Our role has grown as ILAW has. They're our biggest client and that allows us to remain a small family-owned company and still thrive."

So, how does Shaw Brothers remain responsive, thorough and safety-minded no matter what? Teamwork. Nothing personifies that more in this fourth-generation family business than the partnership between Joel and owner Susan Kirby. Susan says, "We're coming up on 50 years of marriage and 17 years running a business together. It just works for us." As a certified Women's Business Enterprise (WBE), Shaw runs a lean six-person operation. Joel directs (and participates in) the field operations and deals with 20 different government agencies. Susan runs the business side, overseeing payroll, accounts payable and receivable, insurance, union reports, safety audits and so much more.

Pretty early on, Shaw began to primarily focus on commercial work, specifically utility projects. The company makes sure the excavated site is fully accessible, traffic control is in place for both worker and citizen safety, and, finally, finishing the surface with either asphalt or concrete. "I pretty much remember every patch in the Champaign-Urbana area," Joel says.

This dynamic duo believes what they do is important to the community and its infrastructure. "We're proud of keeping things working around here. And we're thankful for our partnership with Illinois American Water," Susan says. "They care about their work, the communities they serve and their people just as much as we do. To us, that's success."

When cultures align, it makes for a strong, mutually beneficial business partnership. So is the case for the almost 20-year relationship between Illinois American Water (ILAW) and G.A. Rich & Sons of Deer Creek, Illinois. They're a third-generation mechanical and utility contracting company. It all began in 2005, when Illinois American chose G.A. Rich & Sons to tackle an enormous project in their Champaign, Illinois, waterprocessing plant.

Brian Rich, Director of Business Development, describes it as still their biggest project to date with ILAW. "It was a brand-new production facility, and it also had a well field. In the end, we connected 25,000 feet, or roughly five miles, of piping with the wells and connected it all back to the plant," Brian says. "They're all about improving infrastructure, as we are. In recent years they have obtained many, many sewer plants, and those big projects have really helped us grow."

This was just one example of the "can-do" cultural spirit of the company driven in large part by Tammy Rich-Stimson, president of the company. She and her mother, Susan Rich, are the majority owners. "Our relationship with ILAW works because they elevate us. We want to strive to always meet their stringent standards of quality and safety," Tammy says.

In part, the high-profile jobs with ILAW have helped her professional stature. Tammy is active within the industry, having been appointed the first woman president of the Illinois Plumbing, Heating & Cooling Contractors in its 125-year history. She is also on the Board of Tazewell County, which consists of East Peoria, Pekin, Washington, Deer Creek and several other small communities.

Opportunities have greatly increased for G.A. Rich since partnering with ILAW. They've worked with other American Water entities such as Kentucky American Water, Indiana American Water, Missouri American Water and Iowa American Water.
